Comprehensive Plan: Complete and Approved

The Mayor and Council of Burkittsville, Maryland, are pleased to announce that the Comprehensive Plan for 2015-2035 was approved and adopted at the Dec. 14th, 2015 town meeting. This project, which has been ten years in the works, is now completed, approved and recorded.

The Mayor and Council would like to thank the current Planning and Zoning Commission, the two previous Planning and Zoning Commissions, our Environmental Management and Code Enforcement Admin and all the citizens who gave freely of their time and talent to help with this important task. The State requires that Comprehensive Plans be updated; because of these hard-working people, Burkittsville was not the last Municipality to submit this document to the Maryland State Government.

Without a current Comprehensive Plan, Burkittsville could not continue to be *Burkittsville*. This accomplishment shapes the neighborhood, community and future of our town. Thank you all!

Tale of our Tiny Turnpike

The word "turnpike" conjures up many thoughts. Some may think of modern toll roads like the Pennsylvania Turnpike, while others might consider some of our nation's earliest public roads, like the National Pike (Rt. 40A), which winds its way through the Middletown Valley. Few would ever consider that such a road existed in Burkittsville...

George Alfred "Gath" Townsend began purchasing land atop South Mountain in Crampton's Gap in the 1880s while working on his novel Katy of Catoctin. While many of the buildings were still being constructed on the large estate in 1892, Gath, along with other local business leaders, planned the construction of a turnpike to connect the western edge of the estate to the train depot in Claggett's Station, a mile distant in Pleasant Valley. The Hagerstown Herald and Torch Light reported on Nov. 3, 1892 that the Gapland Turnpike Company had been incorporated with \$3,000.00 in capital stock, divided into shares of \$20.00 each. The road was to be thirty feet wide with 15 feet macadamized.

Were we home to the smallest turnpike in the United States?

Though Gath's name would be the one most associated with the turnpike locally and in the press, the company's incorporators included several prominent citizens of Burkittsville. The largest stockholder in the company was Gath himself, with 51 shares. Closely behind him was Burkittsville's John D. Ahalt, proprietor of the Mountain Spring or "Ahalt's" Distillery with 50 shares.

David M. Whipp, a farmer who lived where the Char-Mar Dairy Farm is now located held 41 shares and **George C. Huffer**, storeowner in Burkittsville, held 11 shares.

For Burkittsville's industrialists and businessmen, the turnpike meant easier transport of their goods to the railroad. In the 1890s, access to the railroad from Burkittsville meant going down the valley over six miles to Brunswick or crossintg the mountain via a narrow, rough road to Claggett's Station (modern-day Gapland) in Washington County. Even with paying a toll, the ease of transporting goods to the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad's Washington County Branch line meant increased profits.

Construction of the road was slow and difficult, owing to the steep and rocky terrain of the mountain. The Frederick *Daily News* reported in 1893 that "the mountain stone was found hard and expensive to break," so to accommodate expanding costs, the turnpike's stock was increased to \$5,000.00. A part of the construction process included building the toll house which served as the main office for the company and a residence for the toll keeper. This building still stands today, located where Gapland and Townsend Roads divide just over the mountain from Burkittsville (where Van Gilder Pottery is located). One of the tollgate keepers for the turnpike was Mrs. Ida Rohrback Stover from Locust Valley.

Collection of SMHS

The life of the turnpike company was short and tumultuous. In 1905, Judge Martin Luther **Keedy** of Hagerstown ordered the turnpike to cease collection of tolls until the road could be upgraded and repaired. Apparently the company was not able to make sufficient repairs. Judge Keedy again ordered a cease to toll collection in 1907. A year later in 1908, the court abolished the turnpike company, ordering that the tollgates be removed and turning the road's care over to Washington County. At least one effort was made to reorganize the company in 1911, but to no avail. Gath left Gapland in 1911 heavily indebted and died while living with his daughter in New York City in 1914. The company's other largest stockholder, John D. Ahalt, died in 1916.

A Retrospective

Jan. 30 - Feb. 28, 2016

Margaret Kennedy, the artist who established Brushmark Studio in Burkittsville during December of 1988, will be featured in a solo show at The Delaplaine Visual Arts Education Center this February.

Opening on January 30, the show's official reception will be on Sat., February 6, from 3-5 pm at 40 South Carroll Street, Frederick.. Free and open to the public, the reception will include light refreshments and good company.

The exhibit includes a range of paintings and mixed-media canvases that Margaret created while living here in Burkittsville.

Hailing from Rochester, NY, Margaret traveled to Oberlin College, OH, where she studied art and art history. She earned her MA, concentrating on printmaking with a specialty in engraving. In addition to her other studies, Margaret explored the art of stained glass.

Margaret attained her MFA from the University of Wisconsin, pursuing her interest in black and white images through drawing, wood cut, and especially lithography.

The move from black and white to color was a natural one for Margaret, who ventured back to working with stained glass during the 60's and 70's. From cutting, painting, firing and leading, Margaret created an entire complement of stained glass windows for six churches in the U.S., designing and fabricating even more from her studio in Indiana. Among other accomplishments, in 1983 Margaret earned her Master of Divinity degree at Earlham College in Richmond, IN, where she also taught art. She taught art at five other colleges and universities in the Midwest and was on the Fine Arts faculty at FCC, Frederick,, MD.

In the 1980's, Margaret's media shifted again; with the inspiration of the New York School of Abstract Expressionists and California Bay area artists, she moved first to oil painting, then to acrylics and collage, with which she creates powerful, abstract art. Acrylics from her Burkittsville years ('87-present), typified in part by blocks of bold, rich color and inspired composition, will be on display in this upcoming exhibit.

Despite its short-lived operation, the Gapland Turnpike holds a unique place in Burkittsville history. Some historians have cited it as the shortest turnpike to ever operate in the country. The road was certainly among the shortest turnpikes in the State of Maryland. Today, we drive over the old turnpike when crossing South Mountain, passing the beautifully preserved toll house which is built from the same native mountain stone "Gath" used in all of his buildings.

Auditions were just held for Valley's play, Aladdin and his Wonderful, Magical Lamp. The play will take place Friday, March 11 and Saturday, March 12.





The Green Little Red Barn Rises


Phase One Complete!
