



Cemetery Board Update

History

In 1831, Henry Burkitt, founder and namesake of the village of Burkittsville, deeded land to the Evangelical Reformed and Evangelical Lutheran Churches for their shared use. Already standing at this time on the south end of the lot was the Union Church, began in 1829 to be shared by the Reformed and Lutheran congregations. Thirty years later, the Lutherans erected St. Paul's Church in 1859 and the Reformed congregation rebuilt the Union Church in 1860, rededicating it as Resurrection Reformed Church. The northern end of the land was used for a burial ground, shared by the two congregations and thus known as Union Cemetery. In 1880, a group of Burkittsville citizens banded together to form The Burkittsville Cemetery Company and to purchase additional land for the cemetery. In 1898, the consistory of Resurrection Reformed Church and the council of St. Paul's Lutheran Church transferred the original cemetery to the Burkittsville Cemetery Company, bringing both parcels of land under the ownership of the Burkittsville Union Cemetery Company, which incorporated in 1947 and still owns the cemetery today.

Cemetery Management

The cemetery is managed by an all-volunteer Board of Directors that oversees the current use as well as preservation of this historical burial ground. Board members include Mark Carroll, Nan Huddy, Sharon Simpson, Shelby Beaver, Micki Beller, and Sam Brown. Nicole Beller, Mary Clark, Joyce Brown, Wayne Haupt, and Paul Beaver also frequently volunteer their time. Other volunteers are always welcome! Maryland Historical Trust

In the early 1800s, at the time of the cemetery's creation, cemeteries were intended to be an integral part of the community and were visited regularly for recreation, scenery, and reflection. The Burkittsville Union Cemetery Company intends to re-energize this historical use of the cemetery. A grant was recently obtained from the Maryland Historical Trust/Heart of the Civil War Heritage Area to support these efforts. Grant projects include installation of three new benches, roadway repairs, repairs to historical monuments, and installation of informational signs for several graves of historical significance, such as Manassas J. Grove.

Other Improvements

A new cremation garden with brick and stone walkways was recently installed near the Route 17 gate. Dying and dead trees were also removed and replaced with new trees.





Spook Hill Cider and Wine Run

Spook Hill Cider and Wine Run is back for Saturday, October 16, 2021! We are hoping to be able to use the scenic, traditional 4-mile hybrid road/XC course that winds through historic Burkittsville, Boordy's South Mountain Vineyard, historic Burkittsville Union Cemetery, and Distillery Lane Ciderworks' orchard. Registration is currently open on spookhill4mile.org. The field will initially be capped at 225 participants. Traditionally there are 500 slots, so registering early is recommended! Once the cap has been reached, a no-risk waiting list will be instituted and if coronavirus gathering restriction numbers are raised, race officials will consider increasing the number of participants and invite those on the waitlist to register.



Food Bank Collection Partnership

Green Tip: Grasscycling

Summer means yardwork! But let's help our friends on 2 wheels.

Don't blow your grass into the roads or alleyways when mowing. The grass is slippery and creates a dangerous hazard for those riding bicycles or motorcycles.

Grasscycling is the practice of returning your grass clippings to your lawn or reusing them for a green purpose. Returning grass clippings to your lawn is an environmentally friendly practice that provides lawns with nutrients and fertilizer, adds organic matter to the soil, reduces landfill waste, saves energy on transportation costs, adds water to your lawn, and keeps your lawn greener and healthier. Grass clippings can be used as compost, mulch for garden beds and planting containers, and layering in a raised bed, and livestock feed. The exception here would be to avoid using clippings that have been recently treated with herbicides for ornamental or vegetable mulch.
