(Water Company continued)

The water system began with two springs atop South Mountain, which fed into two separate reservoirs. The larger had a capacity of 35,000 gallons and the smaller could hold 6,000 gallons. Construction of the system progressed rapidly. Though the state had recommended the use of iron pipes, the water company opted for wooden pipes, bound with wrought iron straps as a more cost effective solution. Two miles of pipe were laid to connect the reservoirs to the town and then to carry water into each individual house. The Frederick Daily News reported on September 19, 1913 that the pipes had reached the town and that houses were being connected to the system.

The water system was completed by early 1914. A brief article in the January 1914 issue of "Fire and Water Engineering" magazine stated that a pressure of 100 pounds could be drawn from the system and water could "be thrown over the highest church steeple in the town." Plans for the water system included the addition of fire hydrants in town and provisions in the company's charter allowed for industrial use of the water, though it is not known if any Burkittsville businesses took advantage of this offer.

By 1918, the five year-old water company was becoming insufficient to serve the town's needs. The system had a total daily output of 10,000 gallons which matched exactly the amount used each day by 40% of the town residents whose homes were connected to the system. In the effort of increasing the water supply, the decision was made to dynamite the springs in the hopes of opening up more water pressure. The opposite happened, the dynamite blast splintered the veins of water and the springs went dry.

Today, the water company that went bust 97 years ago provides an interesting anecdote to the town's history. Much of the infrastructure installed in 1913 remains under Main Street, uncovered every couple of decades during major road projects. When the town square was repaved with cobblestones in 2000, a segment of the pipe was unearthed and given to South Mountain Heritage Society. Fifteen years later, as work continues on rebuilding drainage pipes on the east end of town, more of the pipe has been unearthed and a large segment has been obtained by the museum.
